Aliaa KHACHOUK (1969, Syria) studied theatre and French in Damascus and screenwriting and communication at university in Montreal. She makes feature films, short films and documentaries. Her work has been screened on a variety of Arab TV channels and her films are screened at festivals around the globe.

Lovers' Notebooks

Lovers' Notebooks takes you on the night-time adventures of the men who write on the walls in the Syrian village of Saraqeb. Their slogans and other texts are used to document the revolution for three years, both its euphoria and failure.

The walls are the book. The population of Saraqeb in Syria expresses the ongoing misery in their country and the changes after the revolution through graffiti. The walls are the basis for their existence, providing protection from outside violence. They also bear the names of martyrs, common expressions, poetry, revolutionary slogans and other graffiti. The documentary **Lovers' Notebooks** was shot over three years and is the first film by Saraqeb inhabitant and media activist Eyad Aljarod who directed it with Canadian-Syrian Aliaa Khachouk. The film reveals the constant tension between the revolt-sparked energy and a sense of despair, between leaving a place and the decision to return, between the euphoria about the beauty of an image and the fear of war. During the film and during the night, the walls of Saraqeb are filled with text like a lover's notebook.

In her feature documentary Syrian director Liwaa Yazji explores what it means to set off in a war. She meets friends and people previously unknown to her at their homes. Domiciles where they live now or where they yet live. Spaces that turned into a sought-after commodity.

When does one leave? What does one take? What aspects of life irretrievably end with the departure? How long can one sit tight? How do people call their departure? Are they refugees? Do they move? Do they leave? Do they see themselves as displaced people? Do they just move on? What does home mean? Which rights do they lose? From which loss can they protect themselves? What can they control? By means of her collected stories Yazji draws quasi en passant the trace of the endless refugee movements in the region of the last 70 years.

When the bombs fell, the first thing we did was run away. It was not until later that we realized we had not locked back. We were not allowed to say goodbye to our home, our memories. We have become vacant like these spaces our hastily packed belongings and the forgotten things haunt us \ddot{A} An uncertain existence followed the escape and expulsion from Syria that tamale into a physic and mental nowhere, a non-space between yesterday and tomorrow. A Haunted of the loss of home and security, of the real and metaphoric meaning which a house, a home has in one life.

Born in 1977 in Syria, Rafat Alzakout graduated in 2003 from the Higher Institute of Dramatic Arts in Damascus in theatre acting and started his career as theatre actor and director.

In 2011 and with the outburst of the popular uprising in his home country, Rafat started to search for ways to interlace theatre with film and gained first experience in short filmmaking by directing around 30 satiric short films that use puppet theatre to lampoon the unfolding events in Syria.

As of 2012, his interest in documentary filmmaking led him to start working on his first feature documentary entitled "Home", in which he in the midst of the Syrian turmoil, his passion for theatre leads Rafat, this film's director, on a trip to North Syria where he encounters a group of friends around ballet dancer Ahmed, army deserter Mohammed and art teacher Taj.
